

Case Study: Johnson County, KS & UChicago Data Science for Social Good

GOAL

Identify high-utilizers of EMS & mental health services, plus law enforcement encounters in the County

- Paramedic transport logs
- Jail bookings
- Court records
- Probation records
- Mental health case management

FINDINGS



A key predictor for someone on the list was being disconnect from MHS ~2 years since last contact

Case Study: Iowa City



Alan ####, the man you referenced below, is very familiar to us. Mr. #### is homeless, an alcoholic, and has a number of health issues. He isn't very nice when he's drunk, but he is great to talk to when sober. Here's a picture of (sober) Alan and me having coffee in our downtown one morning. Ignore my double-chin. I'm working on my selfie skills.

Alan is one who causes us many, many issues. <u>Unfortunately, we just don't have a way to work with Alan...That's why you don't see him getting booked. We try to take him to our low barrier shelter when it is available, take him to get showered, but we rarely arrest him.</u>

If there was something that worked to help Alan we would do it, we just don't know what that is. So we respond to the 911 calls and do our best with what we have.
